# WELCOME

The WA College of Agriculture Harvey has a proud tradition of preparing young people for careers in agriculture and related trades. A heavy emphasis on hands on learning and the development of work ready skills means that graduates find themselves readily employed directly in industry and in apprenticeships. A number of students elect to pursue tertiary study after leaving the College.

The College is located at Wokalup which is 8kms south of Harvey, approximately 1 1/2 hours south of Perth and 35 minutes north of Bunbury.

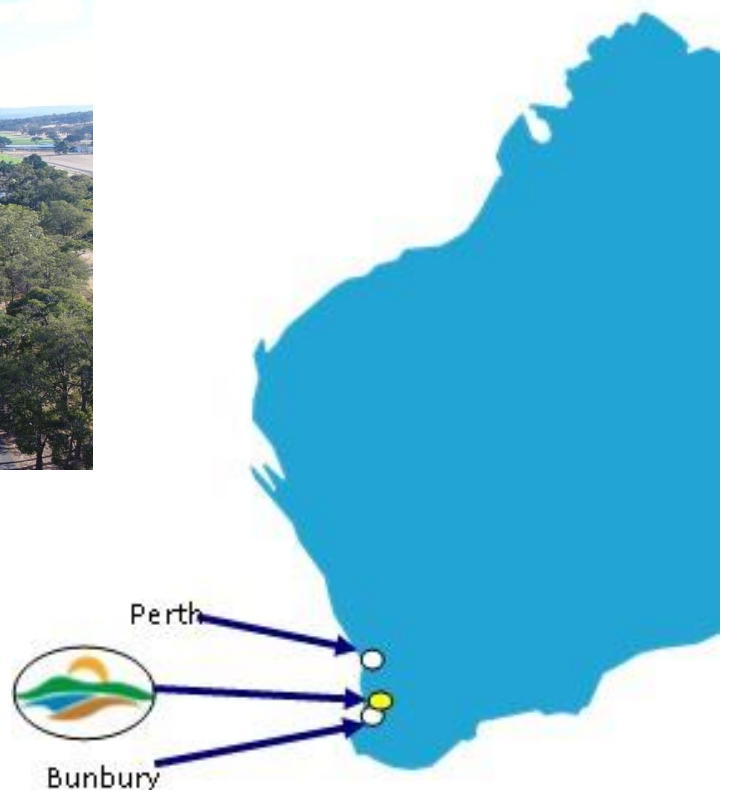
The College was completely rebuilt in 2012 and consists of a residential facility, classrooms, recreational facilities and modern trades workshops. The Farm covers 920 Ha of prime farming country operating a range of different Agricultural enterprise including Beef, Dairy, Sheep and Horticulture.

Students enrol at the College in Years 10, 11 and 12 and come from a wide geographic area but with a similar interest in agriculture and related trades. Places at the College are in high demand and a selection process is used to select students.

The College is a Registered Training Organisation (Provider #50421) delivering nationally recognised training up to AQF Level III qualifications to students in Agriculture and AQF Level II in related Trades. The knowledge and skills gained by students lead to a wide range of employment opportunities and further training. Completion of full qualifications, combined with SCSA based courses provides students with the opportunity to achieve the WACE and Secondary Graduation.

The WA College of Agriculture Harvey has a boarding facility with capacity for approximately 128 male and female students in Years 10, 11 and 12. Students may also attend the College as a Day student.

Through the Residence, the College aims to introduce and develop independent living skills, encouraging students to have confidence, responsibility, motivation and pride in themselves.



# ADMISSIONS

When you are ready, complete the online application but please ensure you have all relevant information to upload. We cannot continue with the application until we receive the latest semester school report.



Student applications are received by the College at any time. The total amount of applications received always exceeds the available places and the application process is highly competitive. We will continue to accept applications once all positions are full and they will be placed on a waitlist.

All applications will be assessed and the applicant may be invited to attend an interview with the Principal or another member of Senior staff. Successful students will be contacted regarding an Offer of Placement at the College throughout the year. Students who receive an Offer of Placement will be invited to attend a Transition Program at the College later in the year before attending as an enrolled student. This program is a great opportunity for students to meet one another and to gain an insight to how the College operates and what to expect when attending the following year.

# SELECTION PROCESS

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Acceptance into the College is based on a number of considerations. Please refer to the below selection process.

Students apply to the College the year before they wish to enrol using the online application, providing school reports and any other supporting information such as employment references, portfolios and resumes.

An initial screening is made based on attitude, behaviour and effort (ABE) and comments in the school reports. Students exhibiting significant behaviour issues are not offered an interview but are invited to provide the College with an improved report at a later date.

Students whose reports indicate satisfactory ABE are offered an interview. The interview is designed to provide additional detail around the following criteria:



## Demonstrated interest in Agriculture and/or related Trades

### Indicators -

- Previous experience.
- Sports and hobbies.
- Work experience- paid/unpaid.
- School subject choices.

## Positive behaviour in learning environments indicators -

- School reports – attendance – behaviour - trust.
- References, letters of commendation, leadership positions.

## A career goal corresponding to the College programs

Compatibility to a residential environment (if a boarding student).

### Indicators -

- Independence.
- Ability to self-regulate and self-manage.
- Behaviour- trust.
- Positive interactions with peers.

The interview is conducted by either the Principal or Vice Principal or another member of Senior staff utilising a standard set of questions and referring to the school reports and other materials provided. Scores for each question are allocated based on a standardised response schedule and a total score is calculated for each student. On the day of the interview, the prospective student and parents will be given a presentation on the College and a tour of the facilities.

Students are ranked based on their score, cut-offs established and offers for positions made. Students without offers remain on hold for later rounds of interviews and selections. A number of rounds of offers are made over the year.

# PATHWAYS

YEAR 10—all students study the same program based on the Australian Curriculum.

YEAR 11 & 12— students have the choice of two Pathways.

## GENERAL EXTENSION PATHWAY

The General Extension Pathway has been designed to provide students with a pathway to university whilst still maximizing time on the Farm and in Trades.

Students in the General Extension Pathway will study courses in the Class area leading to the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) plus the General Extension Pathway Course which will generate an equivalent ATAR score of 70 and guaranteed entry into a number of Curtin University programs.

Students will also work towards nationally recognised certificates in the Farm and Trade areas. These National recognised qualifications will assist students to access employment and further training in the TAFE sector.

Year 11—Students spend 2.5 days in Class (which includes the General Extension Pathway course), 1 day Farm, 1-day Trades and 0.5 day additional Farm.

Year 12—Students spend 2.5 days in Class (which includes the General Extension Pathway Course), plus 1 day Farm, 1-day Trades and 0.5 day Certificate III Agriculture. Students have the opportunity to spend one day per week in work release once Trade qualifications have been completed.

Once students complete the General Extension Pathway course, they will have guaranteed direct access to a wide range of Curtin courses <https://study.curtin.edu.au> such as;

Agribusiness / Environmental Science / Coastal and Marine Science / Mine and Engineering Surveying / Applied Geology / Health Sciences / Commerce / Business Administration / Psychology / Psychology and Human Resource Management / Health Safety and Environment / Early Childhood Education / Primary Education / Secondary Education

All universities offer a range of different entry pathways and most tend to accept each other's enabling/bridging programs. See individual universities websites for specific detail.

## GENERAL PATHWAY

Students will study courses in the Class area leading to the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE). Students will use their certificates gained on Farm and in the Trades area, as well as their WACE to access employment, traineeships, apprenticeships and further training at TAFE.

Students will spend two days in the Class area, one day on Farm, one day on Trades and one day on additional Farm or Trades.



# STUDY PATHWAYS

In Year 12, General students have the opportunity to spend one day per week in work release once Trades or Farm qualifications have been completed.

## DAIRY

The College operates a side rapid exit dairy, milking approximately 140 Holstein cows. Full production figures are maintained with computer-controlled supplementary feeding and integrated identification systems, and activity meters have been introduced to help in heat detection to aid the breeding programme. Females are inseminated both naturally and artificially and the dairy complex provides the perfect opportunity for training purposes. At the beginning of 2023, the College purchased 4 Guernsey and 1 Jersey cows were added to the herd. The Dairy operates 2 centre pivot irrigators which cover 26 Ha, plus an additional 8ha under surface irrigation for summer fodder crops.

The Holstein Stud is involved in preparing and showing heifers at Harvey and Brunswick Shows. Each year approximately 150 dairy calves are reared. All females from this enterprise are kept for replacements of the dairy herd and all males are sold at approximately two months of age.

## BEEF

The beef herd consists of approximately 280 Angus base breeders. The progeny of the commercial herd is sold to various markets. A feedlot trial occurs during Term 1. The Angus Stud consists of 25 females, with bulls bred and selected to be used in the commercial herd.

## SHEEP

The Sheep section comprises of 500-head self-replacing Fine Wool Merino flock which includes a stud flock and ewes mated to Poll Dorset rams for prime lamb production. Students are trained in general sheep husbandry, shearing and wool handling. Students are involved in various shows and competitions throughout the year including wool and ram judging at Wagin Woolorama.

## ORCHARD AND VINEYARDS

Students learn a range of knowledge and skills in managing grape vines through table and Shiraz wine grapes. Most of the produce is used to supply the kitchen or sold at Open Day.

The College manages an orchard in which different varieties of mandarins and oranges are grown as well as avocados. Students are exposed to all aspects of orchard management, tree care and picking and packing for the market.

## VEGETABLES

The College grows a range of seasonal vegetables predominately for the kitchen and students are involved in all aspects of plants, growing, harvest and preparation for market. Several raised beds and a hothouse are used to produce kitchen-ready vegetables and produce year-round.

## PARKS AND GARDENS

The extensive garden areas around the College provide an opportunity for students to learn all aspects of ornamental garden and turf development and maintenance. In addition, students are involved with propagating a range of plant types for production and Landcare purposes.

## PASTURES

Students are involved in pasture establishment and renovation, silage and meadow hay production and a summer maize crop. Dryland and irrigation fodder cropping techniques are demonstrated.

## EQUINE

The Equine section is situated close to the residence, enabling students to attend to their horses after hours. The facilities can house up to 25 student horses, plus 8 College horses, tack up area and tack room. Students have access to an arena and track around the farm. Horse agistment facilities are available for students wishing to have their horse on site for the Equine program and recreational purposes.



# FARM

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## THE FARM

### POULTRY

Approximately 130 Hyline chickens live in a free-range chicken caravan at our eco-shelter and caravan, producing eggs for the College kitchen.

### BUTCHERSHOP

The newly commissioned College butchershop processes farm-grown beef, sheep and pigs and packs ready for kitchen use. Students receive instruction in breaking down carcasses, manufacturing small goods and using techniques such as cryovacing and smoking etc.

### PIGS

The College has a small piggery that is used to grow out weaver piglets which are provided by Morowa Ag College to provide rations for the kitchen. This section is an intensive operation where students regularly weigh and monitor pig health.

### SHEEP

The section has 85 Dorper sheep bred to supply meat to the kitchen.

## EXTRA FARM ACTIVITIES

### ACTIVITIES INVOLVING THE FARM

During the year students are involved in numerous activities during and after school hours. These events give the students an opportunity to gain experience in specific areas of interest.

### WAGIN WOOLORAMA

This annual event is held in Wagin at the end of Term 1 over several days. Students compete in various events ranging in sheep judging, wool grading, shearing, cattle leading and judging.

### DOWERIN FIELD DAY

In Term 3, the College takes a fencing team from each year over to Dowerin to compete against other schools and teams. This event is used for students to put into practice the fencing skills they have learnt at the College over the three years.

### FARM SKILLS—PERTH ROYAL SHOW

At the end of Term 3 a contingent of students from all years head off to the Perth Royal Show to compete in a Farm Skills competition run prior to the commencement of the official opening.

The Agricultural College and School Competition assists students studying agricultural subjects to develop their skills and gain confidence and experience whilst competing in events such as fence construction, pressing and branding a bale of wool, tractor driving obstacle course and safety, wool appraisal, cutting steel plate, chemical safety and first aid.

### CATTLE CLUB

The Cattle Club was formed for students to work with show cattle after school. Students who participate are taught to halter train, lead and prepare for shows. Students are then given the opportunity to show their heifers at numerous South West shows.

# TRADES

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## TRADES COURSE ON OFFER

The College offers four areas delivering nationally recognised training to students in these Trades. The knowledge and skills gained by students lead to a wide range of employment opportunities and further training.

### TRADES FACILITIES

The Trade Training Centre at the College is a state-of-the-art training facility. The four Trade areas offered are: Metals, Furnishings (Wood), Automotive and Building and Construction. Students attend Trades once or twice a week, depending on what course they have selected to study.

### WHO STUDIES TRADES?

All students in Years 10 and 11 are required to undertake the four Trade areas as part of their course for the year.

In Years 11 and 12, depending on which pathway the student has selected, students will attend their Trade subjects once a week and may elect the option of having an extra day in the Trade area.

### BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION (BC)

In Building and Construction students are instructed in laying bricks, making limestone blocks, building sheds and gazebos, other building structures, mixing and laying concrete and much more. Students work both inside the Trades workshop and out on site.

### METAL AND ENGINEERING

Students have the opportunity to work in a state-of-the-art industry metals workshop. Year 10's start with small projects, by the time they reach Year 12 they are able to make trailers, yards, ramps and many more large projects.

### FURNISHING (WOOD)

The variety of equipment the students have access to in the Woodwork workshop allows them to create large projects such as cabinets, tables, beds and TV stands. Students in Year 10 develop skills and refine them on smaller projects before moving to the larger projects in Years 11 and 12.

### AUTOMOTIVE

In Automotive students are taught skills from basic fundamentals through to complete servicing during Year 10—12. If students obtain permission from the Auto instructor, they can bring in their own vehicle to work on during class time.

The weekend is designed for all the Ag Colleges to get together and participate in a friendly and competitive manner.

## COUNTRYWEEK

Like many other schools from around the state, Harvey Ag students participate in Country Week at the end of Term 2 in Perth. Depending on the numbers and sports available, Residential staff will support other College staff in supervising and coaching students in their elected sports.

## COLLEGE BALL

The students at the College have the opportunity to dress up for the Annual College Ball. The Ball committee and Admin staff organise this prestigious event to make it a night to remember for students of all years.

## OTHER ACTIVITIES
